

#### Canada's health-care system, crucial to our nation, needs help

Our health system is about values that define our society, helping the most vulnerable and placing well-being above wealth

There's nothing like an American health-care debate to make Canadians feel lucky.

Donald Trump's first act as president was to sign an executive order taking the first step to repeal the Affordable Care Act. With the stroke of a pen, 20 million Americans may soon find themselves without health insurance.

Not that long ago, many Canadians faced the same challenge.

My grandparents Jacques and Sarah arrived in Montreal in 1951, having left behind everything and everyone they knew in Egypt. The burden of building a new life in this new country fell heavily on Jacques' shoulders. It was a role he assumed dutifully. Until, a year later, when he suffered a heart attack and was hospitalized for nine weeks.

The ordeal diminished him - physically and otherwise. Respiratory symptoms and other complications lingered. The cost of drugs and visits to the doctor were as crippling as the pain in his legs and he was barely able to work. For my grandmother, the twin pressures of caring for an ailing husband and holding the family together became overwhelming.

It was, to say the least, a grinding existence.

The story ends with my grandfather's death at the age of 54 in 1966 - the same year Parliament passed legislation to create medicare. Had it been in place, how different might my grandparents' lives have been?

Our system of health care is about more than money and medicine. It's about the values that define us as a society - are we there for one another when we're at our most vulnerable? Do we place well-being above wealth? Do we believe that good health leads to good outcomes - like a stronger economy, more cohesive communities and more fulfilling lives?

Framed by the debates taking place south of the border, we should never take the answers for granted.

But let's be honest - there are a variety of problems with Canada's health-care system.

People struggle to find a family doctor. They wait too long for specialist consultations and elective surgeries. Service could be better. Outcomes should be boosted. Spending must be sufficient but it must also be sustainable.

We need, in a word, to make health care in Canada better.

So it's time to shift the debate. Let's quit bickering over whether we can sustain public health care in Canada. Let's focus on how

The solutions are neither magical nor beyond our grasp. And most of them don't actually require more money - in fact, some of them will produce savings.

In my book, Better Now, I highlight six ideas that, if implemented, could produce important and wide-ranging transformation. For example, there's no reason we can't ensure that every Canadian has access to a family doctor with whom they enjoy a trusting relationship. In fact, by working in teams with nurses, physiotherapists and pharmacists, we could deliver true patient-centred care.

Wait times for surgeries could be brought down by pooling lists among specialists. We can do a better job of protecting patients from adverse effects and outright harm by reducing unnecessary tests and procedures. And if we were to bring prescription medicines into medicare by creating a national pharmacare system, we could save money and provide everyone with access to life-saving drugs.

Ideas like these could unleash dramatic improvements in Canadian health care right away. All that's required is the political and popular will. And, perhaps even more fundamentally, a commitment to maintaining the principle of universal access that underpins our system and which is once again under fire in the United States.

Our system of universal health care is a fundamental expression of our values and a testament to Canadians' commitment to fairness. It's built on the principle that care should be based upon need, not ability to pay. That's not a value that goes out of style.

If we believe that medicare is a worthy endeavour, then we must also live up to those values and accept the responsibility to make that system work - and work well. It's time to make it better.

# Thousands attend Park Ex vigil for mosque shooting victims

Mourners brave the cold to say Prayers and hope for solidarity

(PXN) A crowd estimated to be as large as 10,000 people gathered in Park Extension's Place de la Gare on Jean Talon St. on the evening of Jan. 30 for a candlelit vigil to mourn the victims of the mass shooting which took place at the Islamic Cultural Centre in Quebec City the day before.

The vigil started with a moment of silence, followed by a somber reading of the six victims' names. Candles were passed around, while some shared hot coffee or hot chocolate to fend off the evening cold in the public square. The evening came to a close with a prayer and wishes

expressed for solidarity among peoples.

#### Place de la Gare SRO crowd

On the day following the shooting, vigils were also held on Montreal's West Island and in Quebec City. At the Dorval Mosque, more than 200 people participated in a vigil held by the Association Musulmane Turque de Montréal. The Dorval Mosque has been the scene of several vandalism incidents recently.

"The vigil that took place in Place de la Gare on Monday January 30 was a wonderful outpouring of support and solidarity with the members of the muslim community," said Villeray/St-Michel/Parc Extension Borough Mayor Anie Samson, the vigil with a number

of other elected officials.

"It was a touching moment, where regardless of our diversity or religious beliefs, people came together to comfort one anothe and pass on messages of love, peace and friendship," added Samson. Park Extension city councillor Mary Deros, who also attended, described the crowd as being "wall to wall." She said the entire area between Provigo, Jean Talon and Hutchison, was packed with participants.

"My thoughts are of sadness because of the violent actions of one individual who went into a peaceful place of worship and opened fire because of who the people were, because of their religious beliefs. First of all any kind of killing is unacceptable to me. And the fact that it was where people went to pray with children and families to me is totally unacceptable.

#### **Deros denounces violence**

"That was such a cowardly act, going into a place of worship and opening fire," added Deros. "For me it's totally unacceptable. This has no place in Canada. So many of our communities have come here to get away from political differences and violence that they experienced in the countries they came from. They came to Canada which has always been a place where they could feel welcomed and they could live in peace and have hope that their children could have a better future here."

Deros saw it as a good sign that such a large crowd turned out. "All these people came out in solidarity. It was cold, it was windy, and yet these people went there," she said. "And a lot were young families with children who came from all over Montreal by bus, they walked, they came by every way they could to show solidarity and to pay respect and show the Muslim families we have here that they should not be afraid of living in Montreal. We are with them and we respect them."

She also found it appropriate that Park Extension, which is renowned for its great harmony despite the fact there are many dozens of cultures living side by side, was chosen as the place to stage such an inspiring intercultural event.

"How often have we shown that Park Extension is the perfect example of peaceful co-habitation, of so many different communities, different languages, cultures, religions?" said Deros. "Name me a district where there are two Sikh temples, two Hindu temples, seven different Christian churches, as well as several mosques on such a small territory.

"I've always worked with cultural communities and I believe that we all need a place to pray. When families are able to pray and practice their religion we have peace. We've always been proud of what we've been able to build together with all the cultural communities of Park Ex."

#### Hellenic Board of Trade holds annual cigar tasting evening

Without apologies to Kipling, who knew a thing or two about stogies all the same, there were plenty of cigars to go around - just as a good number of toasts of single malt scotch whiskey were hoisted and downed - during the Hellenic Board of Trade of Metropolitan Montreal's cigar tasting evening at Stogies Crescent St. cigar lounge on Jan. 25.

"This is our fifth annual cigar event where we invite clients, as well as guests and members of our business community to take part in an evening of fine cigars while enjoying a good drink," said Evan Kiousis, vice-president of marketing for HBOT Montreal.

#### A convivial atmosphere

In Stogies' upstairs cigar lounge and bar where up to 70 people crowded during the event, the air was thick with fragrant cigar haze. As well, the atmosphere was as convivial as a 19th century gentlemen's club. Although a few women members of the HBOT were present. they were outnumbered by their merry male counterparts. And by the look of things, the men appeared to be getting the most enjoyment from the cigars.

#### Impatience growing over delays completing Centennial Park

Green space at corner of Stuart/St. Roch postponed by church project

The long-postponed creation of a new green space at the corner of Stuart Avenue and St. Roch Street – which was initially planned to mark the centennial of Park Extension seven years ago – was the focus of questions from some Park Exers during the Villeray/St-Michel/Parc Extension's February public meeting on Feb. 7.

#### When will there be a park?

Mary McCutcheon, president of the Park Extension Historical Society, noted that a summary of developments over the past year in VSP delivered by Borough Mayor Anie Samson at the beginning of the meeting made no mention at all of the planned green space to be called Centennial Park.

"We see that place as a heritage site and with environmental value," said McCutcheon, describing the PEHS's position with regard to the future park. She wanted to know if at least by this summer some progress might be seen, such as the installation of a bench, to provide evidence to local residents that creation of the park is indeed taking place.

"The development of that park is something close to my heart, just as it is for you and all the residents of Park Extension who want it," city councillor Mary Deros responded. According to Deros, the borough is still waiting for the construction of a nearly-completed Greek Orthodox church adjoining the park site to receive the finishing touches.

#### **Church/borough agreement**

The future park is located on land which once belonged to the church. An agreement struck between the borough and the church wardens several years ago is allowing the park to be built on space that was once occupied by an earlier church building which burned down.

"We are still waiting for construction to be finished," added Deros. "We want it to be a secure place. That's the only reason why we have not started to develop the park up to now. You have to understand the reasons why." All the same, Deros maintained it would be unsafe to install a bench at this stage when the site still has construction debris on it.

Isabel Assunçao, director of culture, sports and leisure for VSP, said finishing the church is the only issue now holding up creation of Centennial Park.

Deros also pointed out that the money set aside for development of the park is still there and allotted for that purpose. "We always said that as soon as construction of that church would be finished we would start the park." McCutcheon responded: "According to me that church is finished." To which Samson replied: "According to you."

#### Church is holding things up

Isabel Assunçao, director of culture, sports and leisure for VSP who is overseeing development of the future park, said: "We cannot go ahead as long as construction of the church isn't finished. It is the only thing which is delaying us. As soon as construction of the church is finished we will be able to go on to the planning and then the work."

Another Park Exer who lives near the site said Deros had pledged in 2014 to hold a public consultation on the park. "When will the consultation happen and how will it happen?" said Laura Wills. "We can organize something this spring," replied Deros.

"Because of the size of the park you can't really do much," Deros added. "This spring we can call a meeting with the citizens of the area and we can take the comments down and see how we can integrate as much of the elements that citizens wish. But as I said it's a small park. There's not much that you can install there."

#### When will church be done?

Wills said she wanted to know when the

church will be finished. "We are presently waiting for some final documents so they can complete certain aspects," said Deros. "And we have not received them yet. We're expecting them in the next weeks, in the next month. I've called one of the parish leaders. Perhaps they're out of town. I have not gotten a call and it's been a week."

#### Beaumont pedestrian problem

Also during question period, Josée Provençal, a Hutchison St. resident who said she was speaking on behalf of parents at the Garderie des Trésors de Beaumont between Hutchison St. and Durocher Ave., pointed out that there are no pedestrian cross walk lights at the corner of Querbes and Beaumont.

"We have twelve seconds on the green light to contend with the vehicles and get by with a stroller or with children less than six years old," she noted, while also pointing out the "near impossibility" of crossing Beaumont from the Acadie Metro station. "The situation is dangerous and we don't want to wait until there is an accident," she said, while adding that there is at least one other children's daycare in the area that is affected.

Councillor Deros said she was optimistic a new traffic light will be installed on Beaumont at the corner of de l'Épée as this would be part of a new crossing configuration for pedestrians and cyclists to be able to cross Beaumont southward to reach the University of Montreal's new campus in the former Outremont railyard. In the meantime, Deros said she has made a request for more time for pedestrians to cross at Querbes and Beaumont.




