On Saturday August 5 2017, the William Hingston Center in Parc-Extension, one of Montreal's most diverse neighborhoods, hosted a special Citizenship Oath Ceremony as part of Canada 150, a year commemorating the 150th anniversary of the Canadian Confederation.

A new life as citizens

Sponsored by the National Bangladeshi-Canadian Council (NBCC) in collaboration with Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada (IRCC), 150 citizenship candidates gathered in the center's auditorium with their families and friends to begin a new life as citizens of Canada.

The event was open to the public and people from the local community enthusiastically attended the very first Canadian citizenship ceremony to be held in their multicultural neighborhood. Citizenship candidates arrived at the venue and volunteers handed gifts and souvenirs with the emblem of Canada to the participants and guests.

Simon Durivage presided

The ceremony was presided by Simon Durivage, a citizenship judge and member of the Order of Canada who is also a retired news anchor formerly with Radio-Canada. He was accompanied by citizenship court clerk Elena Romanko, Constable Christopher Murray of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and Ms. Samiha Hossain who acted as master of ceremonies.

Special guests were invited to welcome and congratulate the new citizens. Speeches were given by David Lametti, Member of Parliament for Lasalle-Émard-Verdun riding, Representative of Honorable Ahmed D. Hussen, Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada, and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Innovation, Science and Economic Development; Mary Deros, City Councillor of the District of Parc-Extension; Mary McCutcheon, President of Parc-Extension Historical Society (SHPEHS); Monir Hossain, President of the National Bangladeshi-Canadian Council (NBCC).

Many guests attended

Other special guests were John Marshall, War Veteran and Senior Citizen of Parc-Extension, Wissam El-Chayeb, Pharmacist-owner of Provigo Jean-Talon, and Paul Awasthi, Senior advisor of India-Canada Organization of Park Extension.

Citizenship candidates took the oath and guests reaffirmed their rights in French and English and the new Canadians received their certificates, gifts and congratulations from the dignitaries and special guests of the event. After speeches took place, the bilingual National Anthem was performed by Ms. Ocean Go accompanied by children on the stage.

Independence gained

Pakistan Independence Day, which is observed annually on August 14, is a national holiday in Pakistan. It commemorates the day when Pakistan achieved independence and was declared a sovereign nation following the end of the British Raj in 1947. Pakistan came into existence following the Independence Act of 1947, under which the British Raj gave independence to the former Dominion of Pakistan. Among those present for the hoisting of the Pakistan flag in Park Extension's Place de la Gare on Aug. 15 were Montreal mayor Denis Coderre, Saint-Laurent Borough Mayor Alan DeSousa, VSP Borough Mayor Anie Samson, Park Extension city councillor Mary Deros, and Laval Les Îles MP Fayçal El-Khoury.

Advice for parents of children starting college or university

Do you feel anxious, insecure and nostalgic as your teenagers begin their post-secondary education? It's normal. Encourage your children to verbalize their feelings about continuing their studies at a post-secondary level.



Show that you support them and are truly interested in their studies.

Make sure your children are aware of the importance of attending classes regularly.

Be on the lookout for signs of fatigue and a lack of interest or motivation. If you see any of these, don't judge their behaviour; try to understand it.

Don't focus only on their marks. If your children aren't very talkative about their marks, don't keep at it all the time. Keep communication channels open by asking general questions. How is school going? Are you happy with your program? Which activities interest you the most?

Ask about which student support services areavailable at the institution (academic or career guidance, learning support, psychological counselling, etc.). If necessary, encourage your children to use these services.

Lastly, don't underestimate the role you can play as a parent in your child's post-secondary education. Be available and attentive, because your support is crucial.

University life: five financial pitfalls to avoid

А university or college student's finances can quickly evaporate if they aren't managed well. Beat the stress and problems related to lack of money by avoiding these traps.

1. BUYING NOW, PAY-ING LATER

For a student, credit cards can be a two-edged sword: they are a great way to establish a credit rating, but they can also destroy it for a long time to come. Just one late payment in your credit file can be enough to ruin your chances for a car loan or an apartment rental agreement.

2. USING STUDENT LOANS AND BURSARIES FOR PLEASURE

You may be tempted to use your loan and grant money to go on a fun spring-break trip, but you'll just end up with even more debt.

3. NOT SAVING

A common mistake is to believe that it's impossible to put money aside while you're a student. In reality, money that you could easily be saving often gets used for unnecessary expenses.


4. GETTING MARRIED TO OBTAIN LOANS AND GRANTS

5. NOT ASKING FOR HELP

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YOUNG CANADIANS SHOULD CONSIDER A CAREER IN SKILLED TRADES

Despite a diminishing supply of skilled trades workers, fewer young people than ever are pursuing these occupations in Canada. There remains a stigma around so-called blue-collar jobs, and young people are frequently unaware that professions in the trades can in fact be highly lucrative and rewarding. Skilled workers are in demand, and unlike many other types of employment, these jobs cannot be sent offshore. While no sector is impervious to economic downswings, many trade workers enjoy job security even during periods of great turmoil.

UNIVERSITY VS. TRADE SCHOOL

A streamlined path into a trade often involves completing a vocational program at a trade school. Unlike university programs, which require all students to take a variety of complementary (and often unrelated) classes, vocational programs focus entirely on preparing pupils for the reality of their chosen professions. In comparison to the four years it takes to complete an undergraduate degree, trade programs can either be two-year associates degrees or even shorter certificate programs. This means trade school students can enter the workforce well ahead of their universityeducated peers, and are also far more



likely to find employment in a position related to their studies.

A BRIGHT FUTURE FOR SKILLED TRADES WORKERS

With an anticipated shortage of skilled workers looming on the horizon, young people who are proactive today have an excellent chance at finding themselves in high-earning, secure positions tomorrow. And thanks to government funding and incentives like the Apprentice Incentive Grant (AIG) and the Apprenticeship Completion Grant (ACG) — which can cover up to \$4,000 for tuition, books, travel and tools — trade schools are now as affordable as they are practical.

HIGH-EARNING SKILLED TRADES

In Canada, an estimated 40 per cent of tradespeople will need to be replaced over the next five to ten years due to widespread retirement. The following skilled trades are among those that pay the best. Variations in salary are impacted by level of experience, type of employment and differences between provinces.

ELECTRICIAN

Salary range: \$42,000 – \$72,000 Testing circuits, installing fixtures and interpreting diagrams are some of the tasks that electricians perform. The majority of them work in construction an industry that's booming, especially in Ontario and British Columbia.

HEAVY MACHINERY OPERATOR

Salary range: \$50,000 – \$80,000 The construction of buildings and public

The construction of buildings and public infrastructure frequently involves the use of heavy machinery. Backhoes, bulldozers, cranes and pile drivers all require skilled operators due to their complexity and potential for danger.

AUTOMOTIVE SERVICE TECHNICIAN (MECHANIC)

Salary range: \$35,000 – \$65,000

As a general rule, the highest-earning mechanics own and operate their own workshops or garages. They repair and maintain automobiles, a service in high, steady demand.

PLUMBER

Salary range: \$45,000 - \$75,000

A plumber's job involves installing, repairing and maintaining pipes, sewers and plumbing fixtures in a variety of settings. They can be self-employed, work for a contractor or hold a position in the maintenance department of factories and plants.

BOILERMAKER AND OTHER METAL FABRICATORS

Salary range: \$65,000 – \$80,000 Metal fabricators fit and weld metal components together to make boilers or other metal products for buildings, bridges, tanks and a variety of other structures. They most frequently work in fabrication plants.



WOMEN IN THE TRADES

In Canada, only 14 per cent of skilled trades apprentices are women, and the vast majority of them are in cosmetology, early childhood education and food services. Traditionally male-dominated trades — carpentry, welding, plumbing, electrical work — are still dominated by male workers. In these positions, women account for only three per cent of the workforce. And yet, it's within the male-dominated trades that the most substantial wages are found. Women wishing to earn good salaries should definitely consider these occupations.

OBSTACLES

Oftentimes, the biggest hurdle women face when it comes to entering the trades is lack of awareness. Many women simply aren't



cognizant that skilled trades careers are even an option for them. Initiatives to get young women thinking about jobs in the trades are popping up in high schools and colleges in every province. Breaking the stigma that surrounds the trades in general and presenting accurate information to tomorrow's workforce will pave the way for better awareness.

GAINING SKILLS

Across the country, trade schools are reaching out to women and encouraging them to enrol in programs where they can gain the capabilities needed to thrive in skilled trades careers. While it can be intimidating to pick up a power tool for the first time, acquiring such new abilities is far easier in

a classroom than on a jobsite. Women wanting to build confidence through hands-on learning should look to trade schools to find the mentors and training they need. Additionally, they may wish to speak with other women who've worked in trades to get a sense of the field's challenges and how to overcome them.

MEDICAL SECTOR TRADES

You don't have to be a doctor or a nurse to make a valuable contribution to the medical sector. There are a number of healthcare trades that make for rewarding and stable careers. With our country's aging population, these trades are expected to be in high demand in the coming years. If you want to give back while you earn a living, consider one of the following vocations.

RADIATION THERAPIST

These professionals deliver radiation treatments to patients with cancer and other aggressive diseases. Using cutting-edge equipment, they administer therapeutic doses of radiation, always taking great care to ensure quantities are accurate. This job can be as taxing as it is rewarding, as it involves working with people who are seriously ill.

DIAGNOSTIC IMAGING TECHNOLOGIST

These technicians are responsible for producing high-quality medical images to allow doctors to monitor and assess a patient's physical condition. They operate technologically advanced equipment such as MRIs, X-rays, CTs and ultrasounds.

RESPIRATORY THERAPIST

These medical professionals evaluate, treat and manage patients experiencing difficulties breathing. They help people who have asthma, emphysema, bronchitis and other cardiopulmonary abnormalities, and analyze and test data — X-rays, blood samples, sputum specimens — to determine the best course of treatment in conjunction with physicians. They also conduct rehabilitation activities.

MEDICAL LABORATORY TECHNOLOGIST

These techs work in labs assessing a range of specimens. Every test ordered by a physician — blood work, throat swab, urine sample, etc. — must be analyzed by a medical laboratory technologist using highly precise tools. They play a vital role in identifying illnesses and helping doctors diagnose patients.





Baseball improvements




