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
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












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Celebrating the Bangladeshi / Canadian community at two separate events

Covid 19 certainly did a lot of damage and while that is an evident understatement, I'd say it's safe to assume that we all have suffered a tad at the hands of this terrible pandemic. But, there is a silver lining visible from a great distance and perhaps many have benefited from this time of disaster in the end. Of course all of this remains to be seen, but for the time being, things are looking up in the realm of real estate and here's why ...

As things stand right now

Driving or perhaps walking around Park Ex, one may have noticed many business fronts closed up. Of course we're not talking about at the height of Covid-19, we're talking about right now, as the community, the city, the province, the country and the world try to get back on track amidst a threat of a new wave.

Walking around, you see a lot of store fronts boarded up still with for rent signs. It's enough to make many wonder about the state of the economy, and there is no question that it certainly has taken a hit, but that doesn't seem to be the case for real estate, even in Park Extension.

As it turns out, people seem to be buying and selling and at an incredible rate.





We spoke to Voula Kottaridis of Royal Lepage and asked her about the state of real estate in the community and she had this to say: "One word: crazy."

We'd say that that is sound bite enough to carry our point across, but of course I've got more for you.

A surge in the market

In Canada, Toronto and Vancouver hold the title for having the busiest and most lucrative markets when it comes to real estate, but apparently, Montréal broke a record of its own just this past July, ranking it a close third at least for a time. Things are still looking up apparently.

Julie Saucier, the president of the Quebec Professional Association of Real Estate Brokers, told CTV news last month: "Right now the market is really crazy in Montreal. But it's really tough to say: is it because people waited, and now they can go back and sell their house? Or is it really that we're seeing a new trend? What we're trying to see is whether it's that people want to have an office at home, or an extra room where they'll be able to work from home, or is it that I want one of my parents to live with me because I don't want them to go in a CHSLD."

Of course this makes sense, seeing that these are the two or rather two of the more important questions now posed because of Covid-19 ... working from a home office, or keeping seniors at home, rather than at a home out of fear of the pandemic. As was reported by CTV, prices rose 46 per cent from last year at the very same time.

Sarker Hope Foundation focuses on Park Extension

(TLN) The Sarker Hope Foundation, whose primary goal is to create a positive living environment for children who are orphans, is launching a new project with the specific goal of providing assistance to Park Extension residents.

"It is a great honor for us to introduce the new project, which is 'Supporting Parc Extension Residents,' by the Sarker Hope Foundation for Parc Extension Residents in Montreal, Canada," said Mustaque Sarker, a well-known Park Extension business owner who is leading the project.

Subsidies from government

"The project is financed by the Government of Canada's Emergency Community Support Fund led by Employment and Social Development Canada," he said, while noting that the Canadian Red Cross Society is also making grants available to non-profits across Canada.

According to Sarker, the 'Supporting Parc Extension Residents project' is a comprehensive project that will be implemented in Parc Extension, Montreal, Canada.

How needs are met

The project's intervention include:

- Transportation and Delivery service;
- Social well-being and mental recovery;
- Children and Youth recreation events and competitions;
- Face Mask distribution and awareness campaign.
- "Our initial plan was to arrange a physical

project inception workshop. However, unfortunately, due to the pandemic, this is impossible," said Sarker, adding that those interested should visit the foundation's website to check out the 'Supporting Parc Extension Residents project.' He said the project's services will be available beginning Wednesday Sept. 9 2020.

About Sarker Hope Foundation

Sarker Hope Foundation registered in the middle of 2019 in Canada as a non-profit organization and commenced operations to establish orphanages in Ghana, Cambodia and Bangladesh. Howver, the 2019 Novel Coronavirus pandemic disrupted the lives of many and Sarker Hope Foundation-SHF says it recognizes that this is a stressful period for everyone.

Amid these uncertain and challenging times, SHF responded in the short term to keep residents safe and contributed to help prevent the COVID-19 pandemic through several institutions in parc extension Montreal and Bangladesh.

Teachers and students coping and navigating with school opening and coronavirus

he pandemic has cast a questionable future over Quebec education and across the country raising a host of questions: Is remote learning possible for every school? What roles will teachers, administrators, paraprofessionals and parents play? While the far-reaching impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic are affecting almost every aspect of life, one area hit particularly hard is Education. With millions of students learning at home for the first time, it is clear that this crisis will have myriad effects on teaching and learning in the 2020–2021 school year, regardless of when classrooms reopen and what type of remote learning practices remain in place.

We are seeing an increasing number of children return to the classroom. According to UNICEF, more than 1 billion students were still out of school due to nationwide school closures. However, 105 of a total of 134 countries that had closed, 78 per cent have decided on a date to reopen schools. 59 of those 105 countries have already reopened schools or plan to open them very soon. Many opened as soon as late August. We've seen the same trend in Quebec and throughout Canada.

Our schools in Laval and Greater Montreal are up and running and many students were anxious and happy to return to their familiar grounds although not knowing what to expect. And many also prefer the online learning from home. Seeing their teachers and reuniting with their friends was the climax.

Given the difficulty of the situation and variation across the globe, countries have been in different stages regarding how and when they plan to reopen their schools. These decisions will be made by national or state governments, often in discussion with local authorities. Making these decisions, the competent authorities at the MEES, Ministry of Education and Higher Education, considered the benefits and risks across education, public health and socio-economic factors, in the local context. Of course, hopefully, the best interest of every child was taken into consideration, using the best available evidence. But exactly how this looks varies from school to school. And, we're already seeing a number of schools in Montreal and Laval already afflicted with students and teachers who have contracted the Corona virus. What's coming up next is anyone's guess.

Decisions on control measures in schools and school closures and openings should be consistent with decisions on other physical distancing and public health response measures within the community. Generally, schools are not opening in countries as an isolated action, but as part as a number of actions related to opening back the country, such as reopening factories, public transport, commercial business.

It was crucial that school boards/Service Centres planned ahead and looked at what additional measures to put into place to help ensure students, teachers and other staff are safe when they returned, and communities are confident in sending their students back to school.

Returning to school looks a little different from what parents and students were used to before. It's possible that schools may have reopened for a period of time and then a decision may be made to close them again temporarily, depending on the local context. Because of the evolving situation, authorities will need to be flexible and ready to adapt to help keep every child safe. Many teachers are worried and are expressing major concern fearing upcoming calamity.

Educators have been shouldering an impossible task: to replicate the functions of school without an actual school building. And that meant thousands of teachers, were isolated at home, having to harness technologies new and old to reach and teach every student. Our schools have never had to improvise like this. And this may well be a recurring situation if the pandemic isn't taken seriously and until the Covid-19 situation is remedied.

Of course, school re-openings must be consistent with the province's $overall\ COVID\text{-}19\ health\ response\ to\ help\ protect\ students,\ staff,\ teachers$ and their families. Some of the practical measures that schools have

Independent MNA still waiting for an apology for his arrest after info leak at UPAC





It's been a while since most people in Quebec heard news from the province's powerful Unité permanente anticorruption – better known as

But Laval-area MNA Guy Ouellette, a former Securité du Québec investigator, is drawing the agency back into the spotlight with a new booklength exposé, as well as a lawsuit that got underway on the same day as his book launch last week.

An arduous task

"Today marks the end of some hard work that

started 10 months ago," Ouellette said in an interview with Newsfirst Multimedia during a media and by-invitation event held in his home riding

Ouellette, who spent a significant part of his three decades in the SQ investigating the Hell's Angels and other criminal motorcycle gangs, says his new 336-page work, Qu'on accuse ou qu'on s'excuse: Les Dessous to mon arrestation illégale, could finally blow the lid over what's left of UPAC.

The book's foreword was written by former National Assembly Speaker Jacques Chagnon, who had previously come vigorously to Ouellette's

Facts for BEI inquest

Ouellette said the book focuses primarily on facts, which he hopes will be put to good use by the Bureau des enquêtes indépendantes (BEI), a Quebec agency that looks into police wrong-doing, to guide them in their investigation of the circumstances that led to Ouellette's arrest by UPAC in October 2017 on suspicion he was involved in a leak of information at UPAC.

Despite the arrest, Ouellette was never charged. First elected as a Quebec Liberal in 2007, Ouellette currently sits as an independent member of the National Assembly. He was expelled from the Quebec Liberal Party caucus shortly before the 2018 election, after news reports claimed he had leaked information about the Liberals to the Coalition Avenir Québec, who won the election. Premier François Legault himself maintained that Ouellette furnished information to the CAO.

Insight into UPAC

"It's insight also," Ouellette added regarding the book, noting that its conclusion raises serious questions as to whether UPAC is needed nine years after the department was created by the then-Liberal government. The other question Ouellette raises, as suggested in the book's main title, is whether he will receive a formal apology from the province's current Premier.

As Ouellette noted, the title, in fact, quotes wordfor-word the phrase used by Jacques Chagnon in the National Assembly on Oct. 31 2017, during a response to Ouellette's arrest. At that time, Chagnon said, "An MNA has suffered a serious blow and his reputation has been tarnished. [...] May charges be brought, or may public apologies be made. May he be charged or may apologies

Chagnon's remarks, as well as a unanimous standing ovation Ouellette received from members of all parties in the National Assembly, were viewed as a strong reaction by the province's elected representatives to what they saw as an ominous threat posed by the police towards parliamentarians.

'I'm not the leak,' he says

Regarding the UPAC leak, Ouellette adamantly maintains he was not the source. "I'm not the leak



UPAC was looking for," he said. "I have nothing to reproach myself for." In addition, Ouellette claims that because UPAC wants to safeguard the identity of the actual source, they are refusing, "But they know" the source, he said, while also claiming that some media outlets are also well aware of the source's identity.

Further to this, Ouellette pointed out that in February 2018, when he was called to testify during court proceedings in Quebec City in a

fraud and abuse of power case pending against former Quebec Liberal cabinet minister Nathalie Normandeau, he swore under oath that he neither knew nor was he the leak's source. He makes that specific claim again in his book.

In an added twist, the first court date for a libel suit Ouellette launched two years ago in conjunction with the UPAC arrest, naming the Quebec Solicitor General as defendant, was delayed until the very day of his book launch last week.

Also in attendance was Jatinder Singh Bhandari, the director of the India Canada Association of Montréal. He was there to show support to the community and it's always great to see him. This is

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
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something he does often—a true Park Ex patriot and he also puts on events of his own across the borough.

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Politics run deeply in Liberal Gov't House Leader Pablo Rodriguez Longtime Honoré-Mercier MP touches base with Newsfirst Multimedia

Just about any way you measure it, there's no denying that Pablo Rodriguez has come a long way in the 44 years since he first arrived in Canada.

The Liberal MP for Honoré-Mercier and current Leader of the Government in the House of Commons first came to Canada with his parents eight years after a key date in Canadian

Parents fled Argentina

Although Pablo was born in Argentina in 1967 – Canada's "centennial year" – Rodriguez's parents had to flee from that South American country to Canada in 1976 after the military junta ruling Argentina repeatedly jailed and tortured his father who had become active in Argentinian

A graduate of the University of Sherbrooke where he obtained a degree in business administration, Pablo Rodriguez spent an earlier part of his career working in public affairs and the management of international development projects. During this time, he became especially focused on humanitarian causes. As such, he was vice-president of Oxfam Québec during the early 2000s.

His introduction to politics

Before entering federal politics, Rodriguez underwent an apprenticeship of sorts as an election organizer and political attaché to former Liberal MP for Papineau Pierre Pettigrew, who served from 1996 to 2006 in several of Prime

According to one anecdote, which Pablo Rodriguez confirms, his father cautioned him not to pursue politics as a career. "My father was running for governor, and he was also a lawyer so he was defending people who were accused of speaking against the government," said Rodriguez.

"So he was thrown in jail. He was tortured. They bombed our house. That's why, when we came to Canada, and we could barely survive at first, my dad said, 'You know son, this is a country where there is freedom of opportunity and you can do whatever you want. But please no politics.

Out to change the world

"But politics is in my blood, it's in my veins," Rodriguez continued. "You want to change the world. That's why I worked for Oxfam in countries in Africa, South America and Asia: to help people. As for politics, as my father always said, there's no perfect tool to change the world. But politics is the best thing for now. And so here

As Government House Leader in the Commons, Pablo Rodriguez is responsible for planning and managing the Liberal government's legislative program. He described the current difficulties that the government is facing while dealing with issues such as the COVID-19 pandemic.

A key role in Liberal gov't

"We're facing this difficult situation in a minority government," he said. "Whatever we do, we have to get the support of another party. As Leader of the Government, the leader is the chief negotiator with the other parties. And remember that right now, during the pandemic, you have to negotiate from your home, from your basement

because you can't go out.

"So you're on the phone fifteen hours a day. This is how I negotiated CERB and other programs sometimes getting the support of one party, sometimes two, sometimes all the parties. We put in place programs we think have been beneficial to Canadians. Not perfect, but they were necessary.

An avid fan of soccer all his life, Rodriguez continues to play the sport in his spare time as part of a team of MPs from all parties who compete on the field in Ottawa. "Thomas Mulcair has played with us. Stéphane Dion," he said.

"Several ministers and MPs. We play together. We also have ambassadors playing sometimes. And sometimes also journalists."

As for the future...

Finally, what does the future hold for Pablo Rodriguez? "I don't know," he replied with a laugh. "It's a privilege just to be around the table as a cabinet minister - it's an honour and a privilege – and I give my best and the people will decide. And I am very thankful to be there for the people of Honoré-Mercier and they will decide to keep me on or not."

Essentially there were a mere few dozen present, but they wanted to gather, said Jahangir to still show a sense of community and a sense of patriotism. In the end, it did show strength in the face of adversity and their presence in the community was still felt despite Covid-19.

City Councilor, Mary Deros was present, as she was present at all three events that were put on over the weekend, and she even spoke a few words to the gathering, urging safety and hopes for seeing everyone again the following year at hopefully a bigger celebration. After her speech, one community member said: "You are part of our family, Mary Deros," at the mic ... a sentiment that many in attendance and across the borough certainly share, as is evident at many of these gatherings.

Event at Jarry Park

And of course that wasn't all for the day, not for me covering the events and not at all for City Councilor Mary Deros. After the above gathering, I made my way through some pretty heavy traffic and entered Jarry Park. Initially I expected there to be very few people, but the park—the entire expanse—was teeming with people, clusters of folks here and there, some respecting the rules in place because of Covid-19, and some not.

I walked through this multitude of people, not really feeling the effects of Covid-19 on society (many were playing sports and sitting and/or lounging here and there very much without a care, as perhaps it would have been in the years of the recent past), and finally I made it to the second gathering of the day, the second Bangladeshi Celebration, and here I found many more people celebrating than at any other event that weekend. There were multiple barbeques going, the smell of chicken emanating and rising to my nose and high above towards the trees shading the picnic area around the gazebo on the St-Laurent side of the park, and of course there was Mary Deros, once again, speaking with members of the community, and giving freely of her time.

This event was supported financially by entrepreneur and Tim Horton's mogul Nazrul Alam Shanu and his good friend Rashid Khan, a local real estate broker and businessman. In addition to the BBQ, there was a massive amount of Tim Horton's doughnuts and coffee, and the overall feel at this gathering was certainly one of community and family, many enjoying themselves and the essence of the celebration regardless of any constraints put upon them by the pandemic. Many other members of the Bangladeshi Community chipped in to help for this event, volunteering, manning BBQs and handing out drinks.

Hopes for the future

And in the end, the sentiment shared by one and all at both these events was certainly one of hope, a hope for the future and perhaps a return to the way things were before, especially when it comes to celebrations like this.

simple: the pandemic, resulting in low interest rates and the fact that there's no inventory for buyers right now ... essentially not enough houses for the amount of buyers out there.

For many of the properties he sells, upon arriving, he'll find as many as up to twenty couples waiting out in front. He also stated: "People are afraid to sell right now, and the houses sell for asking price and often even above." He explained that many offers will come in at once—up to four at a time—and it is then that a bidding war will ensue.

Before the pandemic, houses usually sold within 90 days ... these were houses that didn't sit on the market for a long time ... and today, as things stand, houses sell within ten days. An incredible difference to say the least.

What of the for rent signs?

We spoke to City Councilor Mary Deros and she said that there isn't a problem, or rather none have been reported to her.

The for rent signs are just a sign that some businesses closed due to the pandemic, yet many that we looked into were closed even before the pandemic got underway, therefore the empty store-fronts seem to be but a mere coincidence.

The future of real estate in the community

The industry is never the same from one year to the next and it could certainly rise, but remember whatever goes up can also come down, so be prudent out there folks.


taken include: staggering the start and close of the school day and lunchtimes, reducing class sizes, and ensuring physical distancing inside and outside of the classroom. However, TLN observed students congregated outside school buildings during lunchtime, literally hugging and in close-knit circles. A definite recipe for disaster! What have they not learned? Haven't the parents cautioned their children on their expected behavior?

Moving on, students locally and around the world have shown just how much they want to keep learning. They have persisted with their lessons under difficult circumstances, with the support of their dedicated teachers and parents. But many children will need extra support to catch up on their learning with school re-openings.

Many schools are making plans for catch-up lessons to help bring students back up to speed. This might include starting the year with refresher or remedial courses, after-school programmes or supplemental assignments to be done at home. Given the possibility that many schools may not open full time or for all grades, schools may implement 'blended learning' models, a mix of classroom instruction and remote education, that is, self-study through take home exercises, and online learning.

Understandably, children will be dealing with the stress of the ongoing crisis differently from adults. They need a supportive and nurturing environment with positive responses to questions and expressions of their feelings. Teachers and parents are the primary frontline respondents.




