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Noisy Parc Ex bike path/ parking protests enter their third month

Her back to the wall, VSMPE Mayor Lavigne Lalonde pleads for understanding

VSMPE Borough Mayor Laurence Lavigne Lalonde found herself backed against a proverbial wall, while having to defend her administration's decision to remove hundreds of parking spaces in Parc Extension for more bike paths, after protesters staged yet another noisy demonstration outside the borough council meeting on Oct. 3.



It was the latest instance of local resistance to the borough's plan, stemming from the Projet Montréal administration's ongoing policy which emphasizes environmentally-sustainable mobility while de-emphasizing automobile transport.

Three months of protests

As Parc Extension city councillor Mary Deros noted while ripping into the borough mayor during the council meeting, it was the third month in a row the protestors turned up outside.

The demo drew the scrutiny of a phalanx of Montreal Police officers (a few decked out in riot gear), who set up a barrier near the steps of the borough offices on Ogilvy Ave. to keep the situation in hand.

"You have to always take into account the interests of all the citizens," Deros said during the meeting, noting that opposing voices have even been raised in other sectors of the borough. "It's been 25 years since I was elected in Parc

Extension and never have I seen a degree of miscontent like this, not just in Parc Extension but in Saint-Michel too," added Deros.

Lack of empathy accusation

She accused the borough mayor of a serious lack of empathy for the people who've raised concerns about the elimination of parking spaces. "It's not the answer that the citizens had been waiting for from the administration,"

she said.

Deros said the Projet Montréal administration should "add some water to its wine in order to calm down the popular revolt, while modifying the bike paths project to answer all the needs in the neighbourhood."

Pleading for understanding, the borough mayor insisted it would currently be impossible to create safe bike paths in Parc Extension and other areas of VSMPE without removing parking. "And I can guarantee you that if it had been possible to do it, everybody would be happy now," she said, while adding that the administration was unable to strike a compromise.

Coalition's position

In a statement the protest organizers (Coalition for Democracy Park Extension) released to the media outside the Ogilvy Avenue borough offices, they said they are organizing a fundraiser to commence legal action against the City of Montreal, as well as the Borough of Villeray-Saint Michel-Park Extension.

"This is to contest the city's unilateral imposition of multiple four-season-bike lane projects that will eliminate more than 250 parking spaces in Park Extension alone," said the statement. "The city announced the project on a short two-month notice and therefore, the residents were never given the opportunity to question this decision through proper public consultation process."

The coalition maintains that the following borough streets will lose parking as part of the project: Louvain, Ball, Legendre, Querbes, 24e, de L'Épée, 25e and Ogilvy.

Impact on people's lives

Among other things, the coalition claims the bike path project has sparked concerns about the impact on individuals with limited mobility. They say the removal of parking spaces could further restrict access to essential services such as homecare and deliveries, leading to a decline in the overall quality of life.

"Family connections within the community are also being strained," they added. "The scarcity of parking spaces makes it increasingly difficult for family members to visit their elderly relatives. The proposed project, that was conceived without study, is causing unnecessary mental stress to seniors, families and workers who rely on their cars for their day to day needs."

Time for a closer look at the plight of substitute teachers in public schools

Into the new school year, in the throes of challenges to survival of English school boards, hidden monsters rear their ugly heads.

Québec's costly Education Budget obliges greater understanding of the substitute-teacher phenomenon. The acknowledged substitute-teacher-shortage reflects low-numbers working countless-days. In the interest of Quebec's 1.25 million students and 30,000 non-certified teachers, an unprecedented deep-dive into defining/describing the substitute-teacher-community and its dynamics is warranted.

The Education Ministry and unions, agreeing on shortages of teachers and teachers-on-call - supply - in education-system-jargon, disagree on the problem's gravity, its causes, and how it affects student-learning. Surprisingly, unions offer scant data on the issue.

Substitute-teachers are integral. Teachers get sick, take leaves for maternity/ bereavement/sabbaticals/other reasons, replaced by substitute/supply teachers from school-board on-call lists. Boards insisted on certified teachers. Not anymore. There's no rhyme-or-reason on how substitutes are integrated into schools, provoking many questions.

The unions and Education Ministry agree it's difficult, sometimes impossible, to fill every teacher-opening, but the current crisis is the worst ever. Most openings are specialist positions that have had hiring stress for years, particularly French-Immersion and Special-Education. Getting accurate information on teacher-shortages is difficult, but one would think the contrary, since human resources are-at-play and should-be-at-work.

Québec school regions and union locals struggle for data on open-teaching-positions, uncertified teachers, out-of-province recruitment and teachers-on-call. Semi-official explanations are plagued by conflicting information from school boards and unions. Some boards don't track, thus leaving statistical voids.

Legislation requires certification for public-and-private school-teachers, exceptions/exemptions made through Letters of Tolerance, one-year-passes for university-graduates waiting for certification or relocating from other provinces.

The Ministry of Education must certify more teachers by offering abridged-teacher-education-programs combining online and in-person-classes. Teachers with letters-of-tolerance could earn degrees without leaving their communities for a year, having no income. These pathways would certify many very talented individuals who just don't have formal teaching credentials. Presently, only a Master's program exists, the one-year-program aborted in the 1990s.

In Québec, uncertified teachers aren't rare, many have Bachelor's degrees, having worked for school boards 10-15-20 years, without protection, often treated unfairly, quickly discarded for friends, sons, daughters, nieces and nephews of teachers – in unacknowledged nepotism. No protection for individuals rendering loyal/ professional services.

Why do substitute-teachers pay union dues, without protection, except on working days, deprived of pecking/seniority rights? Unions must do more for these replacement teachers. Common sense questions treatment of these teachers who suffer chronic frustration from non-recognition. Just because no system exists, doesn't mean that one can't be implemented. Several individuals, speaking anonymously, fearing reprisals, stated that substitute teachers must have a say in a union, or at least be recognized within present unions as real entities entitled to rights/benefits of certified/ tenured teachers. "We want our degrees and years-of-service within Boards recognized, and be called upon in that order, same as permanent staff."

Stop who knows who/warm bodies that exclude people with degrees and long service as replacement/contract teachers. "We're educated. We just don't have brevets. It's not about money, same rate-per-day, degreeor-not, changing only on contract," stated the substitute teacher under cover-of-anonymity.

Substitutes need community support. The plight of substitute teachers excluded from school-board human-resources-deployment must be addressed. They're not taken seriously enough but labour-negotiating-power of unions can change things.

Questions require answers. What's regular pay/benefits? Were these unique needs addressed? Not in current negotiations, said Sébastien Joly, executive-director of QPAT, representing Québec public Anglophone teachers. "The subject never came up," he summed up.

Some bureaucratic top-down-military strategies ignore individuals perceived as emotionless robots devoid-of-human needs. Public education demanded that orders be given and obeyed, structures that persist today, sadly devouring defenseless substitute teachers.

In public schools, 2023, principals/vice-principals reign, omitting supportstaff from conversations/equations. Too many administrators and students see substitutes as sub-human, constantly ignored and disrespected, as part-timers.

To move forward, change the title. Substitute Teacher stigmatizes. Substituting isn't easy, try it for a week-or-two. Everyone is an expert on public education but which adults are in classrooms day-in-day-out? Teachers and substitute-teachers. Everyone must be empowered. For public education to improve - start with recognizing substitute- teachers who mitigate difficult scenarios with commitment and grit.

Ultimately, substitute-teachers will need their own provincial union. It would be sinful to write-and-not-be-read, for individuals' names and independence to get lost. Advocating for Individual rights that must-applyto-all, not just the few, is right. Substitutes are crucial throughout public education, yet are treated like migrant workers, invisible, dispensable.

Correction is imperative. Enhancement of public education demands empowerment of all. Substitute teachers deserve appreciation of their worth and value. Ultimately, if unions don't step up, substitute teachers will have to form their own provincial union, as suggested by several anonymous callers.

To shake things, current substitute teachers discarded or wronged by administration, for benefit of favourites, must file union-grievances, best justice until legitimate pecking orders/seniority lists are created and enforced by school boards and unions.

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School violence epidemic

Urgent calls for action in Quebec

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In recent weeks, a wave of violence has swept through Quebec schools, leaving parents increasingly concerned about the safety of their children. The incidents, including a largescale brawl involving over 100 students at École Secondaire Antoine-Brossard and an alarming assault on a 65-year-old teacher in a Lavalarea school, have raised questions about the adequacy of safety measures within educational institutions.

The consequences of these incidents extend beyond the immediate physical harm caused to individuals; they pose a significant threat to the sense of security and well-being and could affect the multicultural community of Park-Extension. As one of the most diverse neighbourhoods in Montreal, Park-Extension is home to a rich tapestry of cultures and ethnicities. The impact of school violence on this community could potentially be not only a matter of physical safety but also raises concerns about the long-term psychological and social effects on its residents.

The incident where a student was hospitalized after perfume was sprayed in her eyes exemplifies the extent of violence that can occur within school premises.

Katherine Korakakis, president of the English Parents Committee Association in an interview she gave in local media, highlights the need for a targeted approach to address the root causes of school violence. She emphasizes that punitive measures alone are insufficient, advocating for a comprehensive strategy that ensures schools do not become prisons. The delicate balance between maintaining a safe learning environment and fostering a nurturing educational space is particularly crucial in a community that thrives on its multicultural dynamics.

Corinne Payne, director general of the Fédération des comités de parents du Québec, draws attention to the voices of students who have long been advocating for policies to address issues like sexual violence. The disconnect between the concerns expressed by students and the response from educators underscores the importance of listening to the needs of the youth within diverse communities like Park-Extension.

As parents from both French and Englishlanguage committees demand action, it's evident that the Quebec government needs to prioritize resource allocation for schools. The statement from a spokesperson for Education Minister Bernard Drainville, acknowledging the government's efforts to formulate a policy to reduce intimidation and violence, is a step in the right direction. However, the urgency of the situation calls for a clear timeline and tangible actions to be implemented promptly. As the government works towards a policy to address these concerns, it is crucial to consider the unique challenges faced by multicultural communities and tailor solutions that resonate with their specific needs.

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VSP adopte son budget de fonctionnement 2024 et son PDI 2024-2033

Les membres du conseil d'arrondissement de Villeray–Saint-Michel–Parc-Extension ont adopté, hier, lors d'une séance de conseil extraordinaire, le budget de fonctionnement 2024 ainsi que le Programme décennal d'immobilisations 2024-2033 (PDI).

« La qualité de vie est au cœur de ce budget, qui se veut aussi vert et solidaire. On a misé sur nos quartiers et travaillé à rendre nos rues plus agréables et sécuritaires, nos ruelles plus vertes et animées, et nos parcs plus attirants et résilients. On a pris soin de nos jeunes et de nos moins jeunes, en soutenant des projets stimulants et en veillant au sort des plus vulnérables. Et tout ça, on l'a fait avec la notion d'équité territoriale en trame de fond, multipliant les investissements dans les quartiers de Parc-Extension et Saint-Michel », a déclaré madame Laurence Lavigne Lalonde, mairesse de l>arrondissement de Villeray–Saint-Michel–Parc-Extension.

Priorités 2024

La transition écologique et le verdissement figurent toujours au premier plan des priorités de VSP. Les activités de plantation et d'entretien de la canopée seront au cœur de la stratégie de lutte contre les îlots de chaleur urbains et de protection de la biodiversité. Un premier exercice de participation citoyenne visant la déminéralisation des espaces privés ou communautaires viendra enraciner un peu plus cette volonté de verdir et de rendre les quartiers plus résilients face aux changements climatiques.

La mobilité douce et la sécurité occuperont aussi une place prédominante et s'inscriront dans la continuité des initiatives déjà réalisées. Le déploiement du plan d'apaisement de la circulation de Parc-Extension sera complété et une démarche similaire sera entreprise dans les quartiers de Villeray et de Saint-Michel. Parallèlement, des interventions de sécurisation se multiplieront aux abords des écoles.

L'Arrondissement continuera de travailler main dans la main avec ses partenaires communautaires afin de contribuer à accroître le sentiment de sécurité de la population. Une attention particulière sera en outre portée à l'amélioration de la propreté et à l'entretien de l'espace public.

De plus, les jeunes de VSP seront appelés à s'exprimer et à partager leurs idées pour prendre part à l'amélioration de leur milieu de vie, à l'intérieur d'un espace de consultation jeunesse.

Des efforts seront déployés afin d'attirer et d'accompagner les acteurs du logement social dans le but d'accélérer la construction d'habitations destinées aux populations plus vulnérables.

La redynamisation de l'artère commerciale de Jarry Est et le développement du pôle culturel de la Cité des arts du cirque, dans Saint-Michel, constitueront des volets importants de la revitalisation de nos quartiers.

Faits saillants du budget de fonctionnement 2024

L'Arrondissement présente un budget équilibré de 66 796 600 \$, soit une hausse de 1 437 100 \$ par rapport à l'année dernière. Cette faible hausse de 2,2%, qui se situe en deçà de l'inflation, reflète une gestion bien contrôlée des dépenses. L'élaboration de ce budget responsable découle de la prise en considération de plusieurs enjeux majeurs. En effet, l'Arrondissement a dû composer avec l'absorption des augmentations salariales dictées par les conventions collectives et une inflation élevée pour les autres postes de dépenses. De plus, il accuse une baisse significative de ses revenus due au ralentissement des mises en chantier observé depuis 2022.

En dépit de ces défis, les équipes de l'Arrondissement ont mis sur pied un budget qui limite le fardeau fiscal des citovennes et des citoyens et qui élimine le recours aux surplus budgétaires comme stratégie d'équilibre. Le taux de taxation demeure identique à celui de 2023, soit 0,0538 par 100 \$ d'évaluation foncière. Ce choix éclairé permet de limiter la hausse de la taxe locale à 10,4%. Les répercussions sur le compte de taxes des propriétaires seront, en fait, infimes. À titre d'exemple, pour 2024, l'augmentation de la taxe locale pour un plex d'une valeur movenne de 734 393 \$ sera estimée à environ 33 \$ pour l'année. L'ensemble des choix budgétaires énumérés ci-haut a notamment permis à l'Arrondissement de pérenniser ses activités de plantation, levier incontournable de la lutte contre les îlots de chaleur urbains.

De plus, la gestion efficiente des ressources figure aussi parmi les mesures plébiscitées pour réussir à rationaliser les dépenses sans toutefois porter atteinte aux services rendus à la population de VSP.

Faits saillants du Programme décennal d'immobilisations (PDI) 2024-2033

Lors de la séance extraordinaire, les membres du conseil ont également adopté une planification d'investissements pour les dix prochaines années. Cette planification présente une vision et une priorisation des projets établis dans le cadre des programmes de réaménagement de réfection routière, des parcs, ainsi que de protection des bâtiments. Des modifications peuvent y être apportées annuellement afin de rester en adéquation avec l'évolution des priorités prédéfinies. Le PDI (brut) 2024-2033 adopté prévoit des investissements de 84 643 000 \$ répartis sur dix ans.

Ces investissements seront répartis de la façon suivante : 44 216 000 \$ pour la réfection routière et réaménagement; 26 762 000 \$ pour la protection des bâtiments et 13 665 000 \$ pour le réaménagement des parcs. Ils seront également financés par différentes sources, tels que le Fonds de parcs de l'Arrondissement et différents programmes de la Ville centre.

Ce PDI contribue significativement à poursuivre les efforts déployés en faveur de l'amélioration des milieux de vie des citoyens et des citoyennes de Villeray–Saint-Michel–Parc-Extension. La transformation majeure du parc George-Vernot et le réaménagement du parc de Villeray en sont de beaux exemples.

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Green transformation and community investment

Unveiling VSP's 2024 budget

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In a recent announcement, Mayor Laurence Lavigne Lalonde introduced the eagerly awaited budget for VSP for the year 2024. The preface to the budget, delivered by Mayor Lalonde, paints a vivid picture of the transformative strides the city has taken in the past year and outlines the ambitious plans for the upcoming fiscal year.

Investment in Saint-Michel and Parc-Extension

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Advancing Canadian healthcare: Federal health minister engages provinces in crucial discussions

Minister Mark Holland focuses on workforce expansion and data integration

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In the heart of Montreal, the borough of Park-Extension is poised to feel the ripples of the comprehensive discussions initiated by Federal Minister of Health, Mark Holland. As federal and provincial authorities convene in Charlottetown to address critical issues in the healthcare sector, the implications of these deliberations extend to communities across the nation, including Park-Extension.

Prioritizing workforce growth

Minister Holland has underlined the urgency of attracting new healthcare professionals into the system while concurrently devising strategies to retain the existing workforce. During a press conference in British Columbia on Tuesday, he highlighted the necessity of scrutinizing foreign credentials and streamlining the process for obtaining pan-Canadian practice permits.

The overarching goal is to fortify the healthcare workforce, ensuring that the system is equipped to handle the evolving demands of public health.

Data integration across provinces

Beyond workforce considerations, the discussions will extend to the improvement of health data integration. This aspect is a key condition of the health agreement proposed by Prime Minister Justin Trudeau in February. Seamless data sharing among provinces is fundamental to enhancing the efficiency and effectiveness of healthcare services across the country.

Bilateral agreements and funding initiatives

The meeting in Prince Edward Island follows British Columbia's recent signing of the first bilateral funding agreement with Ottawa. The Trudeau government has pledged a substantial \$196 billion over the next decade to support provinces and territories in enhancing healthcare accessibility. This comprehensive funding includes increased federal health transfers and individualized agreements tailored to address specific needs in different regions.

In exchange for this financial support, provincial premiers commit to improving data-sharing practices and implementing measurable benchmarks to track progress toward established healthcare goals and targets.

Challenges and optimism

While all provinces and territories have agreed in principle to the health agreement, Quebec stands out as the exception due to hesitations related to reporting expenditure details to Ottawa. Minister Holland, however, remains optimistic about the federal government's ability to reach a consensus with the last reluctant province.

Crisis management and future initiatives

The Canadian Medical Association (CMA) has expressed concerns about the exacerbation of the health crisis in certain regions,



prompting the government to propose new health agreements in February. CMA President Dr. Kathleen Ross plans to convene a reception to facilitate discussions among ministers on resolving healthcare human resource challenges.

Simultaneously, the federal government is actively working on two major programs outlined in the Supply and Confidence Agreement with the New Democratic Party (NDP). These initiatives have the potential to significantly impact healthcare delivery in the provinces.

Minister Holland has committed to introducing a pharmacare bill by year-end, paving the way for a national pharmacare system likely to be administered by the provinces. Additionally, plans for a dental care program, offering coverage to low- and middle-income families not covered by the private sector, will be unveiled in the coming months.

As the two-day meeting in Charlottetown concludes, Health Ministers from across Canada are expected to address the media in a press conference, shedding light on the outcomes and future directions charted during these crucial discussions. The collaborative efforts between federal and provincial authorities underscore a commitment to fortifying and advancing the Canadian healthcare landscape.



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
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

When I resend the information again and again, he claims it never happened or continues to


