

The securing of alleys in VSP

A report on ongoing measures

Alleys in the Villeray–Saint-Michel–Parc-Extension (VSP) borough serve multiple functions, from providing access to residences to being spaces where neighbours interact and children play. However, these diverse uses can sometimes come into conflict, particularly when vehicle traffic poses risks to pedestrians and cyclists. To address these issues, the borough has implemented a strategy aimed at securing alleys and managing traffic to ensure safety while maintaining accessibility. The primary goal of alley security measures

The primary goal of alley security measures is to limit through traffic and reduce vehicle speeds. With these actions, the borough hopes to protect residents, particularly vulnerable groups such as children, from potential hazards. The initiative is part of VSP's broader traffic-calming strategy, which aims to create safer, more peaceful neighbourhoods by reducing the impact of non-local traffic and encouraging slower driving in residential areas. The alleys prioritized for these measures are selected based on several key factors. Those near schools, daycares, or parks are given special attention due to the higher concentration of children in these areas. The borough also responds to direct requests from residents, and specific alleys have been identified during consultations held in the Parc-Extension, central VSP, and eastern sectors. In addition, the presence of children, citizen-led initiatives, nearby bike paths, high levels of vehicle traffic, and the width of the alley are considered in the decision-making process.

In practice, securing an alley often involves closing one of the entrances to prevent through traffic from using it as a shortcut. This is typically done using planters, flexible bollards, or concrete barriers. These solutions are intended to discourage non-resident drivers from entering while still allowing access for those living nearby. By controlling traffic in this way, the borough seeks to balance the need for safety with the practical considerations of local access.

It is important to note that this initiative is not without challenges. While residents generally support efforts to make their neighbourhoods safer, some have raised concerns about the potential inconvenience caused by restricted access. There is also the question of long-term maintenance of the barriers and whether the current measures will be sufficient to address more entrenched traffic issues. The borough will need to monitor the effectiveness of these interventions and make adjustments where necessary.

The measures being implemented in VSP's alleys are part of an ongoing effort to address traffic-related concerns raised by residents. These actions reflect broader trends in urban planning aimed at improving pedestrian safety and reducing reliance on vehicles in residential areas. As this strategy continues to unfold, it will be important to assess the impact on both the safety and accessibility of alleyways in the



borough.

While the security measures aim to reduce risks associated with vehicle traffic in residential alleys, their success will depend on continued community involvement and responsiveness to local needs. The borough's strategy represents a step toward safer neighbourhoods, but ongoing evaluation will be necessary to ensure these measures are effectively addressing the concerns of VSP residents.





Billions of litres of milk wasted while families go hungry

Our outdated dairy supply management system is failing the environment, and Canadians

▼anada's dairy system is drowning in waste – Cup to 10 billion litres of milk discarded over the past decade. This isn't just inefficiency; it's a shocking mismanagement of resources that doesn't fit with today's environmental priorities or changing consumer preferences. The system is broken, and it's time for serious reform to stop squandering billions of dollars worth of milk and resources that could be better used. Since 2012, Canadian dairy farms have wasted over six billion litres of milk, with some estimates suggesting the figure could be closer to 10 billion litres over the last decade. That's milk valued at up to \$14.9 billion, gone down the drain - literally. This massive waste, highlighted in a study set to be published by the Ecological Economics journal, exposes a dairy supply management system (DSMS) that's completely out of touch with today's market demands and environmental realities.

The DSMS was designed to perfectly match milk supply with consumer demand through production quotas, theoretically eliminating waste. Unlike other countries where overproduction is common, Canada's system was supposed to provide stability and efficiency. But that's not what's happening. Instead, farmers, incentivized to overproduce to hedge against variable cow lactation, are flooding the system with excess milk that ends up being thrown away. The environmental cost of this waste is

staggering. The production of this wasted milk has devoured between 920 and 1,900 square kilometres of arable land and guzzled between 930 million and 1.9 billion cubic meters of water. That's on top of 8.4 million tonnes of CO2 emissions – equivalent to adding 330,000 cars to Canada's roads. In a world increasingly concerned with water scarcity, land degradation, and the fight against climate change, this is nothing short of a catastrophe.

And it's not just about environmental harm. The DSMS also ignores the fact that Canadians' dietary preferences are shifting. More people are choosing plant-based alternatives for health, ethical, and environmental reasons. Meanwhile, food insecurity is rising, with more Canadians turning to food banks to survive.

How can we justify throwing away billions of litres of milk while families go hungry?

The Canadian Dairy Commission (CDC), the crown corporation that oversees these quotas, needs a drastic overhaul. For starters, milk waste on farms should be made illegal. The CDC should also implement a milk rescue program, converting surplus milk into powdered form for strategic reserves, much like it does with butter. This wouldn't just cut waste - it would create a safety net for times of market fluctuation. ensuring that surplus milk benefits Canadians instead of becoming an environmental and moral liability.

The time for change is now. First, transparency in the DSMS must be increased. The U.S. dairy industry has systems in place to document and report milk waste, and Canada should follow suit. This would help provide an accurate picture of the problem and encourage more responsible practices.

Second, it's high time to rethink the quota system. It's based on outdated assumptions about the indispensability of milk, and it no longer reflects the realities of today's dietary landscape. Quotas should be adjusted to accommodate the growing demand for plant-based alternatives, moving Canada toward a more sustainable agriculture system.

Finally, exporting surplus milk could be a temporary fix, but it must be done carefully to avoid creating dependency on volatile global markets - something that could sabotage longterm sustainability goals.

If politicians are so eager to defend Bill C-282, which would protect supply management during future trade negotiations and is facing resistance in the Senate, they should also be willing to start an honest conversation about how to make the system work for all Canadians - not just the dairy sector elite

It's time to stop crying over spilled milk and take concrete action to prevent it from happen-

A colourful tribute

PONY's new mural graces La Maison Bleue in Parc-Extension

A vibrant new mural now adorns the walls of La Maison Bleue in the Parc-Extension neighbourhood, adding a splash of color and a message of solidarity to the community. The artwork, a collaboration between renowned artist PONY and muralist Julien Sicre, was completed by the team at MU, a Montreal-based non-profit that specializes in transforming public spaces through murals.

This latest creation celebrates the women of La Maison Bleue, a social perinatal center dedicated to supporting vulnerable pregnant women and their families. Through a colorful depiction of women as flowers, the mural symbolizes their strength and the deep roots they form within the community. The imagery reflects both growth and resilience, embodying La Maison Bleue's role as a safe haven where diverse cultures come together and flourish.

The mural was officially unveiled on October 9, 2024, during an event attended by several dignitaries. Among them were Ericka Alneus, a member of Montreal's executive committee responsible for culture, and Sylvain Ouellet, the deputy mayor of Villeray–Saint-Michel–Parc-Extension. La Maison Bleue: a pillar of support

For over 17 years, La Maison Bleue has been a lifeline for pregnant women facing social vulnerability, helping them overcome challenges while promoting the optimal development of their children from pregnancy until the age of five. The organization operates with an interdisciplinary approach, offering a wide range of services under one roof, including medical, psychosocial, educational, and legal support. Since its founding, La Maison Bleue has assisted over 7,300 individuals and now operates five centers across Montreal, including one in Parc-Extension.

Park Extension's winter car shelter: how to install safely and legally

If you're planning to set up a temporary car shelter this winter, it's essential to understand the rules and regulations that apply in your borough to ensure both compliance and safety. Fortunately, no permit is required to install this type of seasonal structure, but certain guidelines must be followed.

In the borough of Villeray-Saint-Michel-Parc-Extension, temporary car shelters can be installed from October 15 to April 15. After this period, it's mandatory to fully dismantle the structure, including its metal frame, and remove it from the property. The shelter must meet specific criteria, including a maximum height of 3 meters and a width that does not exceed 6.5 meters. Additionally, it should be firmly secured to the ground using either appropriate anchors or counterweights.

When selecting a location for your shelter, make sure it is installed within your residence's designated parking space and positioned at least 0.75 meters away from the sidewalk. If your home is on a street without sidewalks, the shelter must maintain the same distance from the public road. Furthermore, it is essential to ensure that the structure is at least 1.5 meters away from any fire hydrants and 5 meters from intersections if your house is on a corner.

Only one temporary shelter is allowed per residence, so planning its location and installation is key.

Regarding materials, the rules specify that the shelter should be made from synthetic fabric that is white and translucent, with a removable metal frame. If the shelter is installed less than 3 meters from the sidewalk or public road, it must have a window of at least 0.5 square meters on each side. These windows must be positioned at least 2 meters away from the access point to the shelter, ensuring good visibility and safety for drivers and pedestrians alike.

It's important to note that temporary shelters are not permitted in heritage zones. If you are unsure whether your property is located in such an area, contact your borough office for clarification.

Should you need more information or have questions about the rules, you can reach out to your local authorities by dialing 311 within Montreal or 514-872-0311 from outside the city. Operating hours for this service are Monday to Friday from 8:30 AM to 8:30 PM, and on weekends and holidays from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM.

By following these guidelines, you can ensure the safe and compliant installation of your temporary car shelter this winter, while avoiding any potential issues with local regulations.





Incumbent EMSB chairman Joe Ortona seeks another term

'EMSB is much better off today than it was four years ago,' he says

In addition to electing a new slate of commissioners, the Nov. 3 English Montreal School Board elections will also be a vote of approval for Team Ortona's overall efforts to promote education as well as English-language rights, says Joe Ortona, the incumbent chairman of the EMSB's Council of Commissioners.

'Better off,' says Ortona

"A vote for me is a vote for recognizing that by every objective measure, the EMSB is better off today than it was four years ago," Ortona said in an interview with *Nouvelles Parc Extension*



News earlier this week.

Ortona was asked whether he believed this school board election is different from previous EMSB elections in past years.

"With a government that's increasingly hostile towards minorities and the English-speaking community in particular, this election is ensuring that we have strong representation to defend our right to manage and control our English institutions, our public schools," Ortona said.

Higher turnout expected

Although voter participation in school board elections is usually low compared to other types of elections, Ortona believes the voter turnout for this one will be higher because of what is at stake. "We expect it to go up – especially now," he said.

"People understand how important these elections are. And we know that the government is trying to use a low voter turnout to justify abolishing school boards and create service centres. So, I think that is certainly one motivator that people will be using to get out and vote."

Ortona noted that in the last four years, he and the commissioners on his team were at the forefront to legally challenge the Quebec government's Bill 21, Bill 40 and Bill 96.

Three legal challenges

"When we the school boards challenged the government of Quebec, we were doing it under Section 23 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, which falls outside the Notwithstanding Clause that the government invoked, and that protects the school boards and guarantees that they're managed and controlled by the linguistic community in Quebec," he said. "So, we really are the only institutions that can fight Bill 40, Bill 21 and Bill 96 under Section 23 grounds. That's why the court challenges are so important. And it's also important to note that we've won all but one of those court challenges so far.

'We're winning these challenges'

"The only exception is Bill 21 at the Court of Appeal. But on Bill 40, and Bill 96 and even on Bill 21, we won all of the other cases, and on Bill 21 we're appealing to the Supreme Court, so there's going to be a final judgment there.

"So, for the most part we're winning these challenges. Everybody sees that, and I think that's why everybody's proud of the work that we're doing – fighting for our community.

"A vote for me is a vote of approval for the strong stance we took on the court challenges." Ortona added. "I think people know where I stand on the court challenges. I think people know that we're going to continue to defend the English-speaking community.

Education also improved

"And whenever the government tries to adopt legislation that creates further restrictions on our guaranteed Section 23 rights, they know that a vote for Joe Ortona means we're going to be standing up and defending those rights."

In addition to Team Ortona's legal efforts over the past four years, Ortona said that a vote for his team will also be a vote of approval for all of their accomplishments in education in the last four years. "We have the highest success rate in the province of Quebec," he maintained.

Student success soared

"We obtained a 95.9 per cent success rate last year. We surpassed the private sector, which is remarkable, something no school board had ever done before. We invested massively in our infrastructure and in major renovations for our older buildings. "We made sure to provide services in the classrooms, that the resources are there, that we have all the patrols that are necessary in order to allow for the kids to succeed. All of those things we've accomplished in the last four years."

Federal officials touch base with English-speaking communities

'Dialogue Days' focused on social economy's role for Anglos in Quebec

In a bid to expand the federal government's understanding of issues and challenges relating to the entrepreneurship and economic development of official language minority communities, officials with the government met online on Oct. 8 with the leaders of several Quebec Englishlanguage organizations with a related stake.

Dialogue Days

Innovation, Ścience and Economic Development Canada (ISED) hosts bi-annual stakeholder consultations with official language minority communities (Francophones outside Quebec and Anglophones in Quebec), known as Dialogue Days.

This year, the consultation focused on social economy, the goal being to explore the Quebec economic ecosystem and complement other federal initiatives.

ID'ing the priorities

Discussion questions during the meeting dealt with identifying what are the top priority needs of the Quebec English-speaking communities that the social economy model could address, and what strategies/actions or other mechanisms could improve social and economic development change.

Other objectives included bringing together different stakeholders of the English-speaking communities of Quebec and actors of the social economy ecosystem, and deepening the government's understanding of the social economy as a means for social and economic development for the ESCQ and exchange on the needs and priorities of the community.

Views on English-speaking Quebec

One of the community group representatives, John Buck, president and CEO of the Montrealbased Community Economic Development and Employability Corporation (CEDEC), said the CEDEC is now actively promoting two Quebec English-speaking community economic development objectives and four related targets for the next ten years.

He said the English-speaking community of

Quebec "must increase its participation in and contribution to growing Quebec's economy and reap the tangible economic benefits derived from this contribution."

As well, he said Quebec's economy should be leveraged to address the economic disparities and disadvantages the English-speaking community of Quebec is experiencing.

He said that over the next ten years, the English-speaking community of Quebec should seek to create or expand 250 businesses or social enterprises, create or fill 1,000 jobs, attract \$5 million in investment, and reduce by 50 per cent the economic disparities and experiences that the English-speaking community in Quebec is subjected to.

Promoting social economy

Canada Economic Development for Quebec says it would like to pay particular attention to the role of the social economy in the longterm economic development of the regions of Quebec, in complementarity with other federal programs, and considering the Quebec ecosystem.

In that context, the ministry would like to deepen its knowledge of the sector and its players, gain a better understanding of how the social economy can contribute to regional economic development, and identify official language minority communities' needs.

CED says it supports the economic development of official language minority communities with its regular programs and through the Economic Development Initiative (EDI) – Official languages.

Nationwide program

The nationwide initiative has been implemented since 2008 by the regional development agencies (RDAs) and Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED). The initiative was also renewed under the Action Plan for Official Languages 2023-2028.

ISED coordinates the EDI at the national level for reporting, consultation, evaluation activities and conducts research and policy analysis on official language minority communities.

The research aims to expand the federal government's understanding of the issues and challenges relating to official language minority communities' entrepreneurship and economic

Discussing opportunities

CED says events like the Oct. 8 online meeting allow participants to discuss opportunities and challenges that impact the economic development of OLMCs and can help inform the





Divided opinions: balancing economic growth and climate action

When considering what approach government should take, 55% of Canadians believe the government should strive for a balance between economic growth and climate action. This sentiment is particularly strong among Liberal (65%) and NDP (63%) supporters, while only 44% of Conservative supporters share this view.

From September 19 to 25, 2024, Abacus Data

conducted a national survey of 1,701 Canadian adults (18+) to examine their perspectives on climate change and their priorities in the context of pressing immediate challenges, such as the cost of living and housing affordability. Results reveal a significant focus on short-term relief, with many Canadians prioritizing immediate socioeconomic issues over long-term climate action, while also shedding light on the political implications of these perceptions, emphasizing the critical role leaders play in navigating the intersection of immediate concerns and environmental sustainability.

change, while just 49% of Conservative Party supporters share similar concerns. Further, nearly 1 in 4 Conservative supporters indicate that they are not at all concerned with climate change and its potential impact on our future (22%).

Notably, concern about climate change has decreased 14 points since October 2023, which revealed that 76% of Canadians were worried about this issue.


In exploring the reasons behind this decrease in concern, the data reveal that 72% of Canadians prioritize immediate issues over climate change, with only 5% placing a greater emphasis on environmental matters. Among those focused on immediate concerns, 82% who intend to vote Conservative Party hold this view, compared to 57% for Liberal and 65% for NDP supporters. Interestingly, Liberal supporters are more likely to recognize the importance of both climate change and issues related to the cost of living and housing equality, with 32% prioritizing both compared to just 15% of Conservative voters.

This decline in concern regarding climate change, coupled with the majority of Canadians focusing on immediate challenges, suggests that while climate change remains important for many, Canadians are increasingly preoccupied with pressing issues such as the cost of living and housing affordability and a scarcity mindset is framing their priorities at the moment. Divided opinions: balancing economic growth and climate action

When considering what approach government should take, 55% of Canadians believe the government should strive for a balance between economic growth and climate action. This sentiment is particularly strong among Liberal (65%) and NDP (63%) supporters, while only 44% of Conservative supporters share this view. In contrast, a significant 41% of Conservative supporters advocate for prioritizing immediate economic growth, even if it necessitates postponing climate action. This highlights a clear divide in priorities among different political affiliations regarding the relationship between economic development and environmental responsibility.

62% of Canadians believe it is possible to address immediate issues while also tackling climate change, reflecting a growing recognition that these priorities can be pursued simultaneously. This perspective is particularly strong among Liberal (77%) and NDP (70%) supporters, indicating a strong commitment to balancing urgent needs with long-term environmental goals. contrast, only 54% of Conservative supporters share this belief, highlighting differing attitudes across political affiliations regarding the integration of immediate concerns with climate action. This divergence suggests that many Canadians are optimistic about finding solutions that can effectively address both current challenges and the imperative of climate change

Public confidence and expectations in climate leadership

38% of Canadians consider it important for the party they support to have a robust plan for addressing climate change. This sentiment is especially strong among Liberal (55%) and NDP (51%) supporters, while only 24% of Conservative Party voters feel the same way. Notably, 20% of Canadians intending to vote for the Conservative Party indicate that climate change is not a significant factor in their voting decision. This highlights a clear divide in priorities regarding climate action among political affiliations.

When Canadians were asked who they believe is best equipped to tackle climate change and promote the growth of Canada's clean economy, Pierre Poilievre emerged as the preferred choice for 30% of respondents. This indicates that many Canadians now view him as a capable leader on these critical issues. In contrast, only 17% of Canadians believe that Justin Trudeau is the right person for the job. This is particularly striking given that Trudeau has historically been known for his strong stance on climate action and environmental policies. His current standing reflects a noticeable decline in public confidence regarding his climate initiatives. Additionally, just 13% of respondents think Jagmeet Singh is best suited to handle these challenges.

Interestingly, on October 12, 2023, we released a report that asked Canadians who they thought was better able to deal with several issues. In this, 37% of Canadians noted that Justin Trudeau was better able to take action to deal with climate



change compared to 30% who noted they believed it was Pierre Poilievre (32% didn't know who was best at the time).

With 30% of Canadians believing that Pierre Poilievre is the leader best equipped to address climate change while also promoting the growth of Canada's clean economy, it is essential to examine what Canadians expect him to do in this area. Notably, 79% of Canadians feel that if elected, Poilievre should take climate change seriously. This sentiment is particularly strong among Liberal (89%) and NDP (89%) supporters, showcasing a cross-party consensus on the importance of climate action. Even among Conservative supporters, 71% believe that Poilievre should prioritize addressing climate change.

However, a significant gap emerges when it comes to expectations versus beliefs: only 34% of Canadians are confident that Poilievre will take climate change seriously if elected. Among Conservative supporters, this belief is more prevalent, with 55% expressing confidence in his commitment to climate action. In stark contrast, just 25% of Liberal supporters and 20% of NDP supporters share this view. This discrepancy underscores varying levels of trust in Poilievre's climate priorities across political affiliations, highlighting the challenge he faces in aligning public expectations with perceptions of his willingness to take meaningful climate action.

The upshot

In 2024, Canadians have witnessed several extreme weather events, notably the Jasper wildfire, severe flooding in southern Ontario and Quebec, and a major hailstorm in Calgary, to mention a few. Despite these events, we have witnessed a significant decline in concerns surrounding climate change and its impacts across Canada. The decline in concern over climate change raises important questions about whether Canadians are becoming desensitized to the threats posed by extreme weather events, or if the current focus on cost of living is simply overshadowing environmental concerns.

Recent shifts in public opinion indicate that more Canadians now view Pierre Poilievre as the leader best equipped to address climate change and grow Canada's a clean economy, though skepticism about his commitment to climate action remains among many Canadians (including his supporters). As many Canadians still express concern about climate change, Conservatives cannot afford to ignore this issue. To build trust among their voter base, and Canadians in general, Poilievre must bridge the gap between public expectations and political commitments, especially as public sentiment increasingly reflects the interconnectedness of economic and environmental issues.

Climate change remains one of the most politically divisive issues in Canada, particularly in terms of its salience and urgency. Advocates for climate action need to find ways to effectively link climate issues to pressing concerns like the cost of living and safety, particularly for Conservative voters, as these are issues that are far more pressing for many Canadians. It's important for Conservatives to recognize climate change as a real issue impacting Canada today, as neglecting it could become a vulnerability, particularly if short-term worries about costs begin to lessen.




