Justin Trudeau announces his resignation





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(NEWSFIRST) - Monday morning, Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau made a surprising announcement that he will be stepping down as the leader of the Liberal Party and as Prime Minister of Canada. The announcement was made during a press conference held outside his residence at Rideau Cottage in Ottawa, marking a significant moment in Canadian politics.

The great recycling revolution in Quebec

Ending waste, starting sustainability

January 1 marks the beginning of a groundbreaking reform in Quebec's recycling system, as Eco Entreprises Quebec (EQ) takes over the management of selective collection. This bold change shifts responsibility for product life cycles—from production to recycling—to the companies themselves.

In Montreal's Park Extension neighbourhood, the reform holds significant promise. Park Extension residents, many of whom live in multi-family buildings, often face challenges with waste management due to limited space and infrastructure. This new system—with clear guidelines and expanded recyclables-could bring much-needed clarity and convenience to a community eager to reduce waste and promote sustainability. Local community organizations are already stepping up to educate residents about the changes, emphasizing the importance of proper sorting and participation.

With this reform, municipalities no longer oversee or finance recycling. Instead, EQ will manage the process across the province, a move the government under Premier François Legault hopes will reduce landfill waste and increase recycling rates. As part of this effort, the list participate.

Under the new guidelines, all containers, packaging, and printed materials must now go into the recycling bin, even if they are currently not recyclable, such as chip bags and yogurt tubs. This expanded list aims to simplify recycling and boost participation. According to EQ, the inclusion of these items is a step toward creating a more circular economy.

EQ's CEO, Maryse Vermette, is optimistic about the reform's impact. "Our goal is to recycle as much as possible within Quebec, establishing a circular economy for containers, packaging, and printed materials," she said. Vermette emphasized that while some materials will still be exported-particularly mixed fibers and paper-efforts are underway to develop local markets for all recyclable goods by 2025. "This is a crucial part of our responsibility, and we're working hard to make it happen," she added.

Environmental groups have welcomed the change. Karel Ménard, director of the Front Ouebecois for Ecological Waste Management. noted that municipalities lacked control over many of these materials, making the reform a logical shift. "Residents will notice a decrease in their garbage volume because most of the waste consists of packaging that will now be recycled," he said.

The reform also simplifies the logistics

ment allows for better resource allocation and efficiency. Vermette explained, "Having a single owner for all recyclables streamlines the process and creates new opportunities."

Collaboration with municipalities is central to the reform's success. EQ has launched action plans with local governments to improve the quality of materials placed in recycling bins. Some municipalities have even introduced quality control teams to ensure compliance. While EQ had advocated for penalties for non-compliant residents, this measure did not pass.

Education and awareness campaigns are another key component of the initiative. EQ aims to help residents understand what can and cannot be recycled, promoting correct use of recycling bins and increasing participation rates. For neighbourhoods like Park Extension, these campaigns could foster a greater sense of community and shared responsibility for environmental stewardship.

While challenges remain-particularly in finding local markets for certain materials-this reform is a major step toward sustainability. Quebec's bold approach demonstrates its commitment to tackling global environmental challenges through innovative waste management practices. As Vermette puts it, "We're paving the way for a more sustainable future."

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

Principals and teachers must avoid becoming irrelevant

Can principals give relevant advice after they have been out of the classroom for years, or does it only matter how they lead? Should principals only be allowed 3 to 5 years before they are returned to the classroom for a year then reapply for another principalship if still interested in exercising administrative, managerial, motivational, and inspirational skills, talents, and strategies?

Although this idea may be cumbersome and even farfetched, how can it be ensured that principals stay effective in their knowledge when sought out by teachers? After all, there are only so many conferences, articles, discussions, workshops one can experience and even those will never add up to crucial classroom experience. Perhaps a return-to-the-classroom is not needed, assuming that principals can stay current through their teachers, but don't they also need to rely on their own hands-on in classroom experiences to guide kids and teachers alike? Is there an answer?

If by self-assessment, peer-review, and supervisory evaluation, the consensus is that a principal no longer meets the needs of teachers, students, and school board, should they not be encouraged, supported, aided-and-abetted to re-enter classrooms, at least temporarily, to recharge their initial commitment to being the best principal possible?

Why not send them back to the classroom where there is a dire need for more teachers to reduce the often-debilitating ratio of one teacher to 30-40 students? It used to be that once a principal, always be a principal, but it seems it's not so anymore. Principals have to show that they can still effectively do the work needed. Can principals give relevant advice after they have been out classrooms for too-many years? Yes, but that is dependent upon the principals themselves and whether they are willing to learn. If principals go into classrooms and work with teachers, they get perspectives that other principals don't necessarily get. They see effective and ineffective teaching. If they don't go into the classroom, they lose contact and context.

Furthermore, effective principals should be teachers, not necessarily directly to kids but definitely to staff. True, teaching teachers has its own challenges. However, if principals simply "run" meetings, they have lost sight of what it is to teach.

Does it matter how many years they taught, prior to taking hold of an administrative desk? Or does it only matter how they perform as leaders? Then again, there are teachers that have taught 20 years and are ineffective while others who have taught 1 to 5 years, are truly amazing. Teachers that are sponges, willing to grow, tend to excel faster no matter their age. The same should apply to administrators. Do teachers become ineffective after a number of years? It is hoped not. Again, this has more to do with mindsets and being learners. If teachers don't "learn" anymore, then of course they would be out of touch, especially if they don't place themselves in the way that kids learn today based on our changing world.

The dominant trust and belief must be that all stakeholders in schools, whether custodians, parents, students, secretaries, teachers, technicians, guidance counselors, psychologists or principals, and anyone else, have opportunities to be learners and teachers.

Double standards need to be abolished. Many teachers also need to be "re-trained". Teaching, sadly for many is about comfort and routine. If this is true, and principals are imposed term limits, then, it's only fair and effective to advocate that teachers need "reassignment" at the same rate, say every four or five years. Education. especially the public kind delivered by school boards and/or Service Centres is an easy place to dig one's wheel lines and ruts, and like trail-horses, stick to them year-after-year. Essentially, this isn't an issue of Principalship. It's an issue of professionalism. What are principals and teachers doing as professionals to continue their own learning, in and out of school? Staying relevant takes work such as continual professional development, both formal and informal, getting into classrooms on an ongoing and regular basis, and not only observing but working with teachers. If principals aren't learners, it doesn't matter how long they are administrators. learners will

continue to evolve, adapt, stay relevant. The time principals spend learning with staff and students in classrooms is what is valued most. Perhaps the real problem is continuous principal turnover, not principals staying too long. Studies show that average tenures of high school principals is only three years. Rapid turnover of principals leads to increased teacher turnover, problems recruiting and retaining best teachers, and increased reluctance of staff to commit to school improvement efforts. Those seeking to improve schooling through efforts to increase teacher effectiveness are realizing that such efforts rely heavily on a principal's capacity, stability, and good judgement to assess professionally and fairly. A principal's primary job is to drive the mission of the school and to develop the right culture that values, enfranchises and even inspires kids and staff in pursuing that mission. Man or woman, he or she has to manage all of the assembled skills and personalities to get a team to work together towards a common goal. That takes special talent Extraordinary Educational Leaders.

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A new measles case in Montreal has raised concerns as public health officials report widespread exposure across the city during the individual's contagious period. The locations potentially exposed to measles due to this latest case include health facilities, eateries, and other public spaces across Montreal. Among them is the Poissonnerie Falero on Avenue du Parc, a hub frequented by Parc-Extension residents.

What to watch for

Public health officials urge those who may have been at exposure sites during specified times to monitor for symptoms, especially individuals who are unvaccinated. Measles symptoms typically include:

- High fever
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Red, waterv eves
- · Rash starting on the face and spreading to the body

Infants under one year, immunocompromised individuals, and

unvaccinated pregnant women are most at risk. Residents are advised to contact a healthcare provider if symptoms develop, particularly if they fall into high-risk categories.

The importance of vaccination

Parc-Extension's diverse population means public health outreach is critical in multiple languages to ensure awareness of vaccination's protective benefits. The measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine remains the most effective defense against measles, providing over 97% immunity with two doses. Local organizations and healthcare providers, such as the Herzl Clinic and other community health centers, play a vital role in providing access to vaccinations and educating the public about their importance.

Building resilience through awareness

As Montreal navigates the challenges of managing infectious disease exposure, communities like Parc-Extension exemplify the importance of targeted public health measures. Local leaders and public health officials must work together to ensure residents are informed and supported in safeguarding their health.

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What capital gains tax changes could mean for Parc-Extension residents

The Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) has announced it will enforce proposed changes to capital gains taxation, even though Parliament is currently prorogued and the new rules have not yet been passed into law. This decision could have implications for residents of Parc-Extension, particularly those managing small businesses or real estate investments.

The proposed changes, introduced by the federal government last September, aim to increase the taxable portion of capital gains from 50% to two-thirds. While these changes primarily target corporations, they also apply to individuals earning over \$250,000 in capital gains annually.

For a diverse and entrepreneurial community like Parc-Extension, where many residents own small businesses or properties, this could translate into higher tax liabilities when selling assets. Residents who rely on these gains for retirement planning or reinvesting in their businesses may need to rethink their strategies.

Despite the political uncertainty caused by the recent prorogation of Parliament, which delays all legislative activity until March 24, the CRA

has stated it will issue tax forms reflecting the proposed changes by January 31. This means taxpayers will need to prepare their filings based on rules that are not yet law but could become so retroactively.

The Ministry of Finance has reassured Canadians that the CRA will reverse course if Parliament rejects the proposal. However, with the Prime Minister's recent resignation and the disruption in parliamentary proceedings, the situation remains unclear.

For Parc-Extension residents, this development comes at a time when rising costs of living, housing pressures, and economic uncertainty already weigh heavily. Community members with significant gains from selling property or businesses may need to consult financial advisors to plan for the potential impact of these tax changes.

Local advocates are calling for clearer communication from the federal government to ensure individuals and small businesses are not caught off guard. They stress the importance of accessible resources to help residents navigate the complexities of tax changes and their implications.

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
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SECOND FIDDLE

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
