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Drivers urged to slow down as children return to school

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Police are reminding drivers, cyclists and parents to exercise additional caution around schools as thousands of children return to classrooms across Quebec.

The Sûreté du Québec announced increased surveillance of school zones from Aug. 24 through Sept. 11. Although Montreal is served by the SPVM rather than the provincial police, the road-safety rules highlighted during the campaign apply equally to drivers travelling near schools in Parc-Extension.

The beginning of the academic year brings a sudden increase in pedestrians, cyclists, school buses and family vehicles during the morning and afternoon rush periods. Younger children may also be less predictable when crossing streets or moving between parked vehicles.

Motorists must respect the posted speed limit in school zones. Under Quebec law, speeding fines are doubled when an offence occurs during the school period identified on local signs.

When no specific hours are posted, the designated period generally runs from 7 a.m. until 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, from September through June.

Drivers and cyclists must also stop at least five metres from a school bus or minibus when its flashing red lights are activated or its stop sign is extended. The rule does not apply to road users

travelling in the opposite direction when the two sides of the road are separated by a raised median or another physical barrier.

Directions from police officers, school crossing guards and roadwork flag persons must be followed even when they differ from nearby traffic lights or signs.

At a marked pedestrian crossing, motorists must stop when someone has entered the crossing or has clearly indicated an intention to cross.

The SPVM also advises parents against double-parking or stopping in areas reserved for school buses. Children should be dropped off only in authorized locations, while drivers should avoid making U-turns and other abrupt manoeuvres near school entrances.

These precautions are especially important in densely populated neighbourhoods such as Parc-Extension, where schools often share limited street space with apartment buildings, businesses, buses, delivery vehicles and through traffic.

Students walking to school are encouraged to use intersections and marked crossings, follow the instructions of crossing guards and make sure drivers have seen them before stepping into the street. Children cycling to school should use bicycle paths where available, obey traffic signals and wear helmets.

Police emphasize that school-zone safety depends on more than avoiding a ticket. Reduced speeds give drivers additional time to react and can substantially lessen the severity of a collision.



Quebec's new home daycare rules take effect Sept. 1

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Quebec residents operating unrecognized home daycare services face a major legal change on Sept. 1, when most providers caring for more than two children will be required to obtain official recognition.

Until Aug. 31, an individual may provide childcare for as many as six children in a private residence without being recognized by a coordinating office, provided certain conditions are respected.

That category of unrecognized home childcare will effectively disappear when the new rules take effect.

Beginning Sept. 1, anyone providing paid childcare for more than two children in a private residence must be recognized as a home educational childcare provider by the coordinating office serving their territory.

An exception will apply when a person cares for no more than two children or when all the children normally live in the same household.

The change could have particular importance in densely populated and culturally diverse neighbourhoods such as Parc-Extension, where families may rely on small home-based services because of limited access to subsidized daycare spaces, language barriers or non-standard working hours.

Providers who have not completed the recognition process risk having to reduce the number of children in their care or cease operating.

The province says recognized providers are subject to requirements intended to protect children's health, safety, well-being and development. Their homes may be inspected, and providers receive educational and technical support from their coordinating office.

Recognition can also allow a provider to offer reduced-contribution spaces, receive start-up financial assistance and become eligible for other

forms of government support.

The coordinating office has up to 120 days to examine a completed recognition application. Providers who waited until the final weeks before the deadline may therefore be unable to obtain approval before Sept. 1.

Parents using home daycare should ask whether their provider has received recognition or submitted an application. They may also need to confirm whether their current childcare arrangement can legally continue after the deadline.

Until Aug. 31, unrecognized providers must still comply with existing conditions. These include limits on the number and ages of children, first-aid training, liability insurance and written notification to parents that the service is not supervised or evaluated by the Ministry of Families.

The new requirement stems from legislation adopted in 2022 as part of Quebec's effort to complete and regulate its educational childcare network.

Welcome to another challenging school year!

*Come September, quo vadis schools, teachers, families,
and most important of all, children and young people?*

As another school year beckons throughout Québec, classrooms will not only will with students and teachers, but also with countless aspirations that will shape the next ten months—stories of perseverance, frustration, quiet resilience, and at times, deep concern. The beginning of September 2026 invites reflection, and this year, more than most, it calls for an honest reckoning with realities facing all educators and students.

For many students, the final report card will not bring relief, but anxiety. In particular, for those struggling in core subjects such as History of Québec and Canada and other courses required for graduation, the challenge of succeeding despite the obstacles rests heavily on their shoulders.

While academic standards must be upheld, we must ask whether the system will adequately support learners throughout the year. Will interventions be timely? Will teaching strategies be adapted to diverse-learning profiles? Or will gaps widen quietly until they become insurmountable?

Behind every failing grades lie complex stories, rarely a question of ability alone. Motivation, engagement, social-emotional factors, and instructional approaches all play critical roles. Some students disengage not because they cannot succeed, but because paths to success have not been made accessible or meaningful. This concern is even more pressing for young people with special needs, as too many spend their eight-hour school days confined to repetitive routines focused narrowly on basic or "survival" skills. While these skills are undeniably important, they cannot be the ceiling of expectations. Education must also ignite curiosity, creativity, and purpose.

Where are the programs that inspire? Opportunities for these students to explore interests, develop talents, and experience genuine intellectual stimulation? Families place immense trust in the system, believing that schools will help their children grow, not simply manage their time until dismissal. When that trust is met with monotony instead of meaningful engagement, the consequences extend beyond the classroom, diminishing both academic and human potential.

At the same time, teachers continue to shoulder extraordinary responsibilities. They are expected to differentiate instruction, manage increasingly complex classrooms, address behavioural and

emotional needs, and integrate technology, all while meeting curriculum demands, often doing so without sufficient support from school administrators and school-board services.

This raises an uncomfortably necessary question: What role do school board consultants truly play? In theory, they are meant to provide expertise, guidance, and innovative strategies. In practice, many educators are left wondering whether these contributions translate into tangible improvements in the classroom. Are consultants empowering teachers with actionable tools, or are they adding layers of abstraction disconnected from daily realities?

Teachers do not need theory alone. They need practical, sustained support that acknowledges the constraints they face. Leadership, therefore, becomes central. Not leadership in name, but in action. Where is the coordinated vision ensuring that no student falls through the cracks? Where is the accountability when outcomes repeatedly fall short? An effective education system does not rely on isolated disconnected excellence, it depends on, and practices, coherent, system-wide commitment.

Compounding these challenges are cultural shifts that are reshaping student experiences.

Many classrooms are quieter than ever, not because learning is deeper, but because interaction has diminished. Students increasingly turn inward, absorbed by screens and social media. Their primary companions are no longer peers, but devices. Collaboration, spontaneous discussion, and the social fabric of learning are eroding.

Is this the educational environment best suited to child-and-youth growth and development? Obviously not! Technology has undeniable benefits, but when it replaces human connection and contact rather than enhancing it, re-evaluation is crucial. Schools must be spaces where students learn not only content, but how to communicate, debate, empathize, and belong.

The re-assessment should lead to the value-added reality that education is a life-changing human relationship, one where respect, high expectations, and personal interaction change lives. While times have evolved, the core principle remains relevant. Students thrive when they feel seen, challenged, and inspired. If that spirit feels distant today, it is not because it is outdated, but because it requires thoughtful effort to sustain it in a rapidly-changing world.

And yet, despite these concerns, there is

reason for hope. Countless educators continue to passionately and unceasingly toil above their pay scale, adapting lessons late into evening, advocating fiercely for students, creating moments of relational growth that no policy can mandate. Students, too, are heroes, demonstrating resilience, navigating pressures and uncertainties with quiet determination that deserves recognition.

Hope, however, must be matched with action. It is not enough just to acknowledge challenges that must be addressed with clarity and purpose. This means investing in meaningful support for teachers, rethinking programming for students with special needs, ensuring early-and-effective academic interventions, and restoring the significance of human exchange in our classrooms. It also means holding decision-makers accountable.

Policies must translate into practice. Resources must reach those who need them most. Leadership must be visible, responsive, and grounded in the realities of schools. The new school year must open with a realistic view of 2026-2027; past obstacles must be recognized and future measures devised to do justice to the need for children to thrive, gradually but decisively. Mediocrity cannot be the benchmark any longer, knowing the potential that exists within every classroom.

To students who will struggle, the journey is not defined by a single report card. To those of you who have yet to succeed, we urge you to continue your path forward, to have faith in the belief that your abilities extend far beyond what any limited program may suggest.

To all teachers, we whole-heartedly invite you to rejoice in the beauty, essence, and substance of your mission to lead children out of darkness into light, despite the supposedly insurmountable obstacles. Your work matters more than ever, and your dedication is the key to what is best to come in the educating of our children and young people.

May the coming school year bring renewal, rebirth, and reinvigorated commitment to the crucial mission you have undertaken to fulfill in caring for the most vulnerable members of a society in need of your passion, hard work, and hope for a better future for all. May 2026-2027 bring new breakthroughs in every level of the system, to truly serve the children and families who depend on it.

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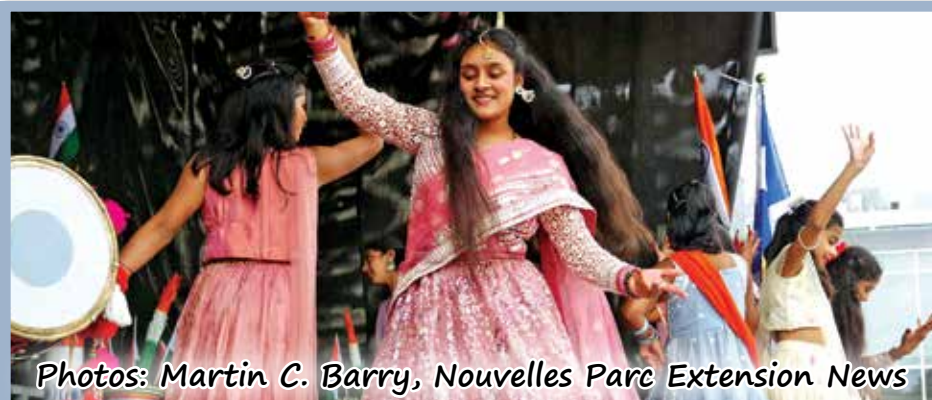
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Parc Exers rejoice on the 80th anniversary of India's independence

*South Asian nation's economy continues
to grow in leaps and bounds*

Indian folk dancers graced the outdoor stage at the India-Canada Organization's celebration on Sunday August 16 of the 80th anniversary of the founding of the Republic of India.

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Place de la Gare, one of Park Extension's best-known outdoor meeting places, was filled with joy and jubilation on the afternoon of Sunday Aug. 16 as people of Indian heritage from throughout the Montreal region gathered to take part in festivities marking the day eight decades ago when India became a nation.

India Independence Day is one of the largest public events in Parc Extension every year. Months of preparation take place, leading up to it annually.

Guest artists came from far

In addition to being the country's 80th anniversary, this year was also the 24th time the India-Canada Organization sponsored and coordinated the celebration in the heart of Parc Extension.

"We have guest artists here today from as far away as south India," the India-Canada Organization's Naseer Mehdi Khan said in an interview with Nouvelles Parc Extension News,

adding that every one of the 28 states in India was represented by an artist or cultural group

this year.

While also pointing out that 29 official languages are spoken in India, in addition to more than 1,500 linguistic dialects, he noted, "all this in one country, India, which is incredible. And the growth of India of going so fast now."

Among the dignitaries attending the celebration were Laurier-Dorion Liberal candidate Randy Legault-Rankin, Liberal MNA for Viau Frantz Benjamin, Lac-Saint-Louis Liberal MP Francis Scarpaleggia, and veteran Montreal city councillor Alan DeSousa who is also Saint-Laurent's borough mayor.

Support and admiration

"I am here with some of my former colleagues like Alan DeSousa to show support and admiration for the Indian Canadian community which has done so much for Quebec," said Benjamin, who represented the district of Saint-Michel on Montreal city council before being elected to the Quebec National Assembly.

India Independence Day is also an occasion for people of Indian heritage to publicly speak about progress that's been made over the previous year in the home country and to focus on issues of concern there.

Since the early 1990s, India has emerged as one of the fastest-growing economies in the developing world. This has been accompanied by increases in life expectancy, literacy rates and food security. India is now one of the world's largest economies by nominal GDP, and third-largest by purchasing power parity.

Clearly in a mood to party, they gathered at the centre of Parc Extension on the weekend of Saturday August 15 to talk, eat, dance and soak up some Hellenic joie de vivre at the annual festival.

Held at the same time as the Greek Orthodox Church's Feast of the Dormition of the Mother of God (August 15), Saturday evening was zero hour for a culminating celebration of all things Greek.

Dancing in the streets

As is the case every year, the dancing and feasting all took place at the corner of Saint Roch and Outremont streets. There, people of all ages – many of them Hellenic teens – formed circles and danced until late into the evening.

In an apparent surge of attendance since last year,

well over 20,000 people gathered on Saint Roch Saturday evening as well as over the weekend.

Parc Extension city councillor Elvira Carhuallanqui, who arrived in Parc Extension from Peru more than 20 years ago, said in an interview with Nouvelles Parc Extension News that some of her first memories of the neighbourhood were of its Greek residents and their traditions.

"I know the area well and some of my first memories were of the Greeks," she said, noting that she was attending the Greek festival long before being elected.

'Disappointing' street repairs

Former city councillor Mary Deros, who represented Parc Extension for 27 years, said she was disappointed with the borough's failure to coordinate sidewalk repairs in the area in a timely fashion so as not to impede the festival.

"They knew this festival was coming," she told Nouvelles Parc Extension News. "They did a whole lot of sidewalk work and enlarged some of the intersections."



"They could have done this at the beginning so that by the time we were celebrating this holy summer festival, we would not have detour signage and construction fences blocking the streets."

Ahuntsic-Cartierville city councillor Effie Giannou, speaking on behalf of Mayor Soraya

Martinez Ferrada as deputy mayor, said:

"It's always a pleasure to be here every summer, especially after I return from a trip to Greece. This is an amazing festival year after year. Thank you very much to the organizers for everything they do."
